Commander's Report:

<u>Cherry Hill Armory Re-evaluation:</u> The Adjutant General recently visited the armory to evaluate cost savings and military unit priorities that may result in relocation of some entities presently meeting at the armory. To get a better estimate of the situation, the Commander and Staff will be meeting with the station commander, LTC Walter Nall, on November 10th for a briefing that may impact on future activities of this association. More information as it becomes available.

<u>Museum Report (CW Elberson)</u>: Small improvements continue to be made by the museum curator CW Jack Elberson. A small work crew will be assembling on November 10th to continue with displays and picture placement.

<u>The Dine Out</u>: Three additional awards were nominated for evaluation by the Awards Committee and will be presented for approval. Money for the AD book has had a strong start. To date we have collected \$575.00. The success of our Dine Out depends largely on how well we do with our AD Book. Everyone was asked to help make this special effort a success.

<u>Election of Officers (Major DiMedio)</u>: Names of candidates for Executive Officer, Logistics Officer and Finance Officer will be presented at our December meeting. Nominations from the floor will be made at our January meeting and published in the January newsletter. The elections will take place at our February meeting.

<u>Christmas covered dish meeting</u>: The December meeting will consist of a short meeting, dedication of our museum and a covered dish dinner orchestrated by the women of the association.

The meeting was adjourned at 1945 hours.


Association Dues
