

THE GULF WAR

Groaning under the financial burdens incurred during an eight-year war against Iran, and unable to gain concessions from its Arab neighbors, Iraq invaded Kuwait on August 2, 1990. Concerned about the Iraqi military's sudden proximity to Saudi Arabia's Hama oil fields, the United States and more than two dozen coalition partners launched a counterattack a few months later. Though many weeks of strategic bombing had weakened Iraq's military machine, tensions ran high in the days leading up to this offensive, due to the presumed strength and experience of Iraq's battle-hardened Republican Guard. But the coalition forces swept through Kuwait almost without opposition, destroying or expelling Iraqi forces as they went. The war ranks among the most lopsided in history, but it restored the morale of the American military, helping it to finally shake its Troops marched across the Memorial Bridge in "Vietnam Syndrome." Washington, D.C. toward the Pentagon, during the National Victory Day Parade on Saturday, June 8, 1991. The celebration drew an estimated 8000,000 spectators.
