Retired Senior Leaders Briefing

On Thursday 21 June 2012 the Adjutant General for NJ, BG Michael Cunniff, conducted a retired senior leaders briefing to help keep retired senior leaders abreast of the current and future status of the NJ Army & Air NG. The following is a summary of that briefing.

- 1. Everyone in the room was individually recognized. It included retiree's from WW II, Korea, Vietnam, Iraq and Afghanistan.
- 2. The strength and deployment status of Army & Air NJ units from NJ. This included deployments to such countries as Kuwait, Kosovo, Cuba & Afghanistan to name a few.
- 3. NJ continues its partnership with Albania that started in 1993. This year there are 25 missions scheduled with a wide range of activities.
- 4. There are 37 armories in NJ. Four are planning to be sold. The NJ WETEP (weekend equipment training & equipment pool just off Route 539 at Ft Dix) has been upgraded at the cost of thousands of dollars to include classroom areas. The Aviation Support Facility at Lakehurst and the Regional Training Facility at Sea Girt have been renovated & upgraded at the cost of 84 million dollars, both 100% federally funded.
- 5. The NJ Youth Challenge Program, a 22 week program which provides alternative educational opportunities to High School dropouts, operating since 1994, has graduated 3110 students to date. Three hundred & seventy seven of these graduates have chosen to enlist in the military after graduation.
- 6. There are three Veterans Memorial Homes in NJ. Menlo Park, Paramus and Vineland. All of them have waiting list. There are 447 veterans on the waiting list for Vineland.
- 7. There were two "Stand-downs" conducted in NJ in 2011. The one conducted in Cherry Hill on 23 Sep 11 resulted in supporting 273 homeless veterans from the South Jersey area. The next "Stand-down" is scheduled for 28 Sep 12.
- 8. The Cherry Hill armory is the only armory in Camden County and not in jeopardy of elimination per comments by Col (R) Charlie Ragucci. The armory is scheduled for a vulnerability assessment in the near future per BG (R) Steve Hines.

<u>9/11 Bus Trip</u>

On Saturday 23 June 2012 members of the association participated in a bus trip to NY World Trade Center sponsored by the Senior Citizens United Community Services, Inc. (SCUCS) of Camden County. Included in this trip were Ed & Ronnie Powell; Tony Radice & Sue Barrowman; Lou Bovino & Barbara Rouh; Joe, Ginny & Randy Scioli and Ed McCarty.

Included in the trip was a visit to the South Side Seaport, St. Paul's chapel (which served as a relief mission for recovery workers at Ground Zero during the 9/11 tragedy) and ground zero itself to view the magnificent reconstruction. The trip was concluded by a wonderful meal at Villa Romanza restaurant, located just outside of Trenton, on the way home.
